**Dear colleagues!**

We invite researchers in the field of experimental and generative linguistics, applied and computational linguistics, digital linguodidactics to participate in the International Scientific Conference **“Language in the Age of Digital Transformation and Artificial Intelligence Development”**, which will be held on **October 22–23, 2026** at Belarusian State University of Foreign Languages.

Doctoral students, postgraduate students and graduate students are also invited to participate.

**The following topics for discussion are suggested:**

- corpus studies of language and speech;
- artificial intelligence technologies for solving linguistic problems;
- speech technologies and artificial intelligence;
- language training in the digital educational space;
- psychological and pedagogical aspects of the digital transformation of language education;
- multimodal communication in virtual space;
- computational lexicography;
- digital technologies in translation and translation education;
- interdisciplinary research based on textual data analysis;
- neural networks and generative artificial intelligence in media;
- digital technologies in intercultural communication;
- automatic natural language processing: experience and prospects;
- language as a social phenomenon in the era of digital transformation: a human in the new communicative space.

**Working languages of the conference:** Russian, Belarusian, English.

**Form of participation:** face-to-face and live online participation. The conference is planned to be held in a combined format.

### Terms of participation

To participate in the conference, it is necessary to fill in the application form and send the abstract of the article (1000–1500 characters) via the link <https://forms.gle/jhgKGdy6nhCdpjwb9> by **June 15, 2026**.

Authors of the articles approved to participate in the conference will be acknowledged via e-mail by **July 1, 2026**.

Articles are accepted until **September 1, 2026**, at the email address: **fen@bsufl.by**. The file name should contain the author's surname and the document title, for example: "Ivanov\_Article Title.docx".

The Organizing Committee reserves the right to select articles to include in the conference program. The collection will include articles with at least 70% originality, not previously published and prepared within the framework of the problem field of the conference.

The conference program, as well as the amount and payment details for the registration fee (for in-person participants), will be sent by email no later than **October 10, 2026**.

The collection of conference articles will be published in electronic form by **November 23, 2026**, and placed in free access in the BSUFL repository, in the Scientific Electronic Library elibrary.ru (Russia) with subsequent indexing in the Russian Science Citation Index (RSCI).

### Guidelines for submitting articles

The volume is **at least 5 pages**.

The article is formatted as follows:

- Text editor – MS Word, font – Times New Roman, size (keg) – 14 pt.
- Margins – 2 cm on all sides.
- Line spacing is single.
- Paragraph indent – 1 cm.
- The Universal Decimal Classification (UDC) index is italicized in the upper left corner of the page.
- Before the title of the publication in Russian and English (in two columns) should be indicated:
  - o surname (last name) and patronymic in full form (in bold upright font; separated by a continuous space: Ctrl + Shift + space);
  - o academic degree;
  - o city and country of residence (in parentheses);
  - o place of employment;
  - o position;
  - o e-mail address (in italics).
- The title of the article in Russian is indicated in capital letters across a blank line in the center.
- The title of the article is followed by a brief (1000–1500 characters) abstract in Russian, spaced at the beginning of the line in 12 pt font.
- On the next line after the title Keywords in 12 pt font, the key words (5–7 words) in Russian are separated by semicolons.
- The same information in English (title of the article in capital letters, abstract, keywords) is given across the blank line.

- The text is typed after a blank line with a paragraph indent with mandatory width alignment and automatic hyphenation. Pages are not numbered.
- Examples in the text (in any language) are italicized, translations of examples are obligatory in single quotes, e.g. *a table* ‘a table’. Dictionary definitions are double-quoted “...”.
- An unbroken space shall be placed between the letters of initials, between initials and surname, as well as before the dash.
- It is advisable to avoid page-by-page footnotes in the text of articles.
- In-text citations are placed in square brackets indicating the source and page number, e.g. [1, p. 12] or [2, p. 15].
- After the text of the article, the LITERATURE section is indicated through a blank line (capital, centered); a list of literature is given through a blank line after it, which is ranked in the order of their appearance in the text, and numbered. The bibliographic data is formalized according to [the SIBID standard “Bibliographic reference”](#) according to the following model:
